ACCREDITATION OF COUNSELING CENTER

The American Board on Professional Standards in Vocational Counseling recently notified Dr. John J. Rooney that the counseling services of the La Salle College Counseling Center have received its approval. La Salle College thus becomes the only Catholic college in the nation to hold this accreditation. Catholic Universities that have been accredited include Georgetown, Catholic University, Marquette, Seton Hall, and John Carroll. In this area, the University of Pennsylvania is the only other institution so accredited.

FACULTY EXCHANGE CLUB

The following idea on a faculty informal luncheon club was submitted by Edward Dillon, Eugene Fitzgerald, E. Russell Naughton and John Penny.

It would be good for faculty members here at La Salle to get together from time to time to exchange ideas. In order to achieve this under suitable conditions, we are starting an informal luncheon club which we shall identify as the Faculty Exchange Club.

We are planning a 12:30 luncheon at Alden Park Manor for Tuesday, April 15th. This is to be a "dutch treat" affair--everyone takes care of his own check. Under such circumstances, members would likely introduce a variety of topics for discussion which should be of interest to all present.

We hereby invite each and every member of the faculty who may be interested to come have lunch and talk with us.

Two things we would emphasize: 1) the affairs will be strictly informal (no papers); 2) participation is to be on a purely voluntary and self-paying basis.

We hope to be able to get a private dining room for each of our sessions. In order to do this, it will be necessary that we know in advance just how many will be present. We would like for everyone who plans to join us to indicate that fact to Ed Dillon in the Counseling Center before the 10th of April.

One final note--luncheons at Alden Park run about Two Dollars (\$2.00), drinks are extra.

SUMMER STUDY ABROAD

Each summer many educational institutions abroad provide courses of interest to students from the United States. The regular academic programs are suspended during the summer, and courses are given in the country's language, history and civilization. Some institutions offer special courses for teachers of foreign languages and for advanced scholars. There are also offerings in fields such as music, art, law, political science and sociology.

Those faculty members interested in this study abroad may consult the office of the Vice-President, C104, for universities, opening and closing dates, courses offered, etc.

LATEST STUDENT-FACULTY COMMITTEE MEETING Among Points of Discussion were:

Members of the Committee were unanimous in approving the preparation of a petition requesting that the fifth period on Tuesdays be restored to the campus clubs. It was pointed out that some clubs have not been able to hold a meeting for the past six weeks. Teachers should not be allowed to schedule classes at that time and cultural events should not be scheduled for Tuesdays. On days when the weather requires drill in the Auditorium it is recommended that the maintenance staff be alerted to the need for the placing of a sufficient number of chairs by 12:30 P.M.

The Committee approved a motion made by Student Council President requesting the College Policy Committee to consider the appointment of a student (or students) to the Faculty Discipline Committee. Council President claimed that some students express misunderstanding concerning past disciplinary action taken against individuals and that student representation on the Faculty Discipline Committee would prevent this kind of misunderstanding and these feelings that injustice has been done, even if there was no injustice.

A sub-committee was appointed to study a prepared student council organization chart. Several members felt that one or another unit on the present chart were misplaced.
