REVISED SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR 1959-60 (Office of the President)

1. Administrator

The Dean of students, Brother Gavin Paul, will be the official administrator of La Salle College's Program of Student Aid.

2. Competitive Scholarships

Each of the four scholarships offered are valued at \$300.00 per semester (\$2400.00 over the four years). These scholarships are to be awarded to the four candidates who have applied for a competitive Scholarship and who have attained the highest scores on the College Entrance Examination Boards. Each of these students shall be required to maintain a scholastic index of 3.00, or else lose his grant until he again attains this index.

3. Principal Scholarships

The Principal scholarship program has been revised as follows: With the purpose in mind that only topflight high school students should receive a Principal's scholarship, each Principal is to be informed that this award must be given to a senior student who is in the first quintile of his graduating class and who has succeeded in attaining a total score of 1200 in the verbal and math tests of the College Entrance Examination Boards. It should further be required that the Principal scholarship winner maintain a scholastic index of 3.00 in order to retain his scholarship.

4. Athletic Scholarships

The Athletic Committee's revised policy for rendering financial aid to athletes has been adopted. It is to be noted that the athletic grant is to be discontinued during the time that the student is placed upon academic or disciplinary probation.

5. Courtesy Scholarships

Scholarship grants valued at \$300.00 per semester be given to the sons of full-time faculty members, and members of the administration, as well as to the natural brothers of the Christian Brothers of the Baltimore District. Grants valued at \$150.00 per semester may be given to co-lateral relatives of the Brothers and to part-time faculty members, should the need exist, and should these students satisfy admissions standards. It should be required that students given courtesy grants maintain a scholastic index of 2.00 plus four hours of work per week, in order to retain the grant.

DANFORTH FACULTY CREATIVE TEACHING SEMINARS (From the Office of the Vice-Pres.)

An invitation to college teachers to participate in a series of 1959 Danforth Faculty Summer Seminars on Creative Teaching, with special attention to moral and spiritual foundations, has been received by La Salle College. The Danforth Foundation will sponsor the seminars in cooperation with eight institutions of higher learning, each of which will provide a limited number of scholarships covering tuition-fees, board and lodging. FROM THE OFFICE OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT

STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM (Office of the Dean of Students)

The National Defense Student Loan Program has created more general interest among Colleges and Universities than was expected. More than 1200 institutions enrolling about 80% of the college population of the country are participating. They filed requests for loan funds totalling about \$2,000,000. The initial government appropriation for the program to meet these requests was only \$6,000,000 for the entire United States. (Consequently La Salle College has been allotted about 1/10 of its requested amount). However, the President of the United States has announced his intention to request additional funds for distribution among applying Colleges and Universities in the amount of \$24,000,000. If the Congress appropriates this sum, each participating institution may expect to receive approximately 4 times again as much money as it received in the initial distribution of funds. In this event La Salle College could expect to receive approximately 50% of the amount of money it originally requested.

The administration of the loan program will be as follows: The President of the College is the chief contracting officer of the College. Therefore, he shall be the institutional representative of the National Defense Loan Program who will be responsible for the general conduct of the program at La Salle College.

Under the direction of the President, the Dean of Students, assisted by a Faculty Committee, shall receive and review the individual student applications for loans. He shall determine the applicant's eligibility, decide the amount and conditions of each approved loan and transmit the approved applications to the Business Office.

Under the direction of the President, the administration of loans approved by the Dean of Students shall be the function of the Business Office. Subject to institutional policy, and the terms and conditions of the National Defense Student Loan Program the Business Manager or his representative will process the loan, including verification of any required endorsements, make the advances to borrowers, establish repayment schedules and subsequently receive the repayments of principal and interest.
