BACCALAUREATE MASS: This year the Baccalaureate Mass will be held at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Price and Ardleigh Streets, in Germantown, on Wednesday, June 3, at 10:00 a.m.

The faculty will vest in academic gowns in the Basement Church (towards the rear of the Gospel (left) side of the Church). Please be present by 9:30 a.m.

Gowns should be picked up at the College, Room C-110, between 8:15 and 9:15 a.m. on Wednesday morning, June 3. Gowns should be kept for use in the Commencement Ceremonies to be held later this same day.

The COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES will take place at Convention Hall, 34th and Spruce Streets, at 5:00 p.m. on June 3. Gowns not picked up for the Baccalaureate Mass will be brought to Convention Hall for the Commencement Exercises.

Faculty members will vest in the basement of Convention Hall auditorium in the center aisle, to the rear of the graduating students. Signs will designate more definite locations. Racks will be available for clothing and gowns.

Please be on hand for the Commencement by 4:30 p.m. at the latest. Parking facilities are immediately adjacent to Convention Hall. Enter Convention Hall by the main entrance and use stairs or elevators to the Exhibition Hall.

Announcement from The Fund for Adult Education

Awards of \$1,000 each for the three best speeches or articles on public leadership have recently been established by The Fund for Adult Education. Awards, to be given in each of the years 1959 and 1960, are designed to generate the best thinking on the nature of public leadership and on ways in which more adequate education can be provided to help prepare American leadership on every level of social, economic and political organization to serve the general welfare.

For purposes of the Awards, the term "leadership" encompasses the whole range of positions in which executive decisions and executive actions have public consequences. It would include, for example, elected and appointed executives in federal, state and municipal governments, corporation executives, members of boards of directors of national organizations, school board members and college trustees, foundation officials, labor leaders, leaders of political parties, executives serving abroad, either in governmental or private positions, et cetera. On the other hand, the term "leadership" in the Award context, excludes from consideration leadership whose force is primarily intellectual, spiritual or artistic.

The Fund for Adult Education was established in 1951 by the Ford Foundation as an independent organization having as its central purpose the expansion of opportunities that contribute to the continuing development of the mature individual in the responsible exercise of his freedom, both as a private person and as a citizen. The Fund's special emphasis on preparation for leadership stems from recognition that the margin of our survival as a free nation depends as never before in our history on the wisdom, courage and dedication of those responsible for developing and carrying out public policies. It is hoped that the award-winning speeches and articles will yield insights into such questions as the nature of executive leadership, the ways in which it emerges and is exercised in American society, the major problems which executive leaders face in common, and the kind of education which can best motivate individuals to assume the responsibilities of leadership and best equip them to understand the challenges of the times and meet them creatively and with informed devotion to the public welfare.
