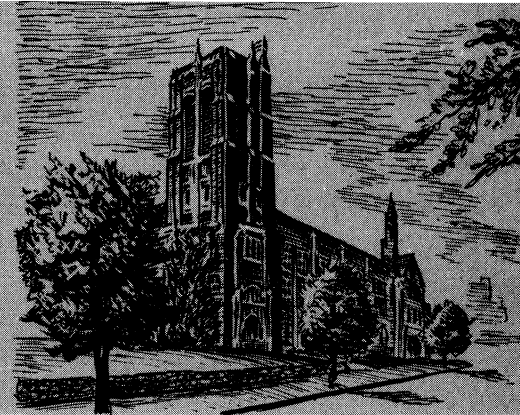

ACLS Announces Grants

The American Council of Learned Societies, of 345 East 46th St., N.Y. 17, N.Y., has announced fellowships and grants for post-doctoral research during the 1960-61 academic year.

The fellowships provide a maximum stipend of \$7,000, and the grants-in-aid provide a maximum of \$2,000. The former "are intended primarily for the provision of free time," but also allow amounts for travel, clerical or research assistance, and reproduction or purchase of materials.

Among the fields of specialization mentioned are: philosophy; aesthetics; philology; languages; literature, and linguistics; archaeology; art;

history; cultural anthropology; folklore, and musicology.

For fellowships, the applicant must not be over 45 years of age, and the deadline for applications is Oct. 31, 1960.

For grants in aid, no age limit is specified, and two deadlines are given: Oct. 10, 1960, or February 15, 1961.

Area programs administered by the ACLS include grants for "Research on Asia," and grants for "Slavic and East European Studies."

Further information, if desired, may be obtained from the office of the Dean of the College.
