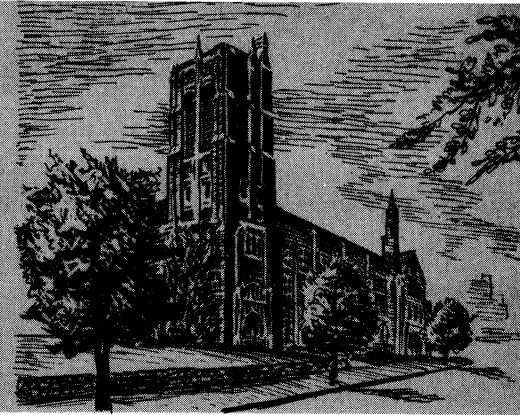

PHILOSOPHY INSTITUTE

LOGOS, the Philosophy Club at Holy Family College, has invited all members of the La Salle College faculty to attend an Institute on THE PHILOSOPHY OF LIFE OR EXISTENCE, to be held on the Holy Family campus from January to May of this year.

The program consisting of ten lectures, has been divided into two parts: FIVE EXISTENTIALIST THEMES; and, FIVE EXISTENTIALIST THINKERS. Dr. Frederick Patka, associate professor and Chairman of the Philosophy Department at Holy Family, will conduct the first five lectures. Other speakers are: Thomas Gallagher, Ph.D., assistant professor of Philosophy, Chestnut Hill College; Heinz Mownkemeyer, Ph.D., assistant professor of Philosophy, University of Pennsylvania; Donald A. Gallagher, Ph.D., vice-chairman, department of Philosophy, Graduate School, Villanova University; Joseph M. Mihalich, M.A., assistant professor of Philosophy, La Salle College; and Eugene Fitzgerald, assistant professor of Philosophy, La Salle College.

The lectures will be held Jan. 6 and 14, Feb. 10 and 23, March 2 and 24, Apr. 6 and 27, and May 4 and 18. There is no admission fee. The series will be held in the evening from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., in the lecture hall at Holy Family College. The schedule calls for a 60 minute lecture, a brief

intermission followed by a 50 minute discussion period.

ART EXHIBIT

Fifteen oil paintings by John Brantley Wilder will be exhibited in the College Union Lounge from January 11, 1960 to February 10, 1960. The exhibit will open with a reception Thursday, January 14 at 8:30 p.m., to which all faculty members are invited.
