Graduation on June 9th

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Summer Research Grants & Special Teaching Assignments of the Faculty Announced

Brother Daniel Bernian, President recently announced the institution of a new program of Faculty grants for research and course improvement projects during the Summer.

The first four grants, of \$1000 each, in the program were determined from various applications by a seven member Research Leave Committee which included last year's winner of distinguished teaching awards.

The recipients are the following: Dr. Robert J. Courtney of the Political Science Department for a comparative study of the council-manager form of government in Pennsylvania.

Dennis McCarthy, Chairman, Department of History, for research on Charles XII, of Sweden, and on Viscount Gray.

Dr. John J. Rooney, Chairman, Department of Psychology, for a continuing investigation of psychological characteristics of applicants to religious communities.

Brother Gregorian Paul, of the Chemistry Department for a laboratory manual in a new co-ordinating course in Chemistry for seniors.

Two members of the English Department, Brother C. Joseph and Brother Fidelian, have received grants from the Mary Finn Foundation of New York to pursue studies in Modern Literature at the University of London.

Mr. George Diehl, lecturer in Music, has been invited by the Western German Government to participate in a conference on Contemporary Music at Darmstadt, Germany.

Brother E. Austin of the Psychology Department will teach in a Counseling Workshop in Oakland, California.

In the Physics Department Mr. Joseph Simmons has received a grant from the National Science Foundation to attend a workshop in Optics in Memphis Tenn.. Brother G. Lewis has received an NSF Grant to attend a Physics Institute at the University of Kansas.

Brother Alban of the Mathematics Department has been invited to participate in a Math Research Project at Loyola University in New Orleans.

In the Theology Department Brother F. James, Chairman, will attend an institute on recent developments in Scriptural Studies in Toronto, Canada; Fr. Mark Heath will pursue special studies in Sacramental Theology at Collegeville and Fr. Bailie at Immaculata

Brother David Hilary of the Classics Department will teach a graduate course in the History of the Greek Language at Manhattan College.

In the Biology Department, Dr. Thomas Lowery and Dr. Charles Wurtz will conduct a Science Training Program for high school students. The program is supported by the National Science Foundation and will be held on campus. Dr. Wurtz will also deliver a paper later in the summer at an International Conference in Tokyo, Japan.

Brother E. Nicholas also of the Biology Department, will conduct a workshop for La Salle and other students in the Geology of the Black Hills on location in South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana.

Dr. Russell Naughton, Chairman of the Philosophy Department has received a national Science Foundation Grant to participate in an Institute at Texas A & M.

Brother Raymond, Chairman of Chemistry Department has received an NSF Grant for an Institute at the University of Utah.

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### Rax Ruling on Research and Publication Expenses

College and University Business, of April 1964, highlights a recent Internal Revenue Ruling concerning research. The article, appearing on Page 76, is entitled, "I.R.S. Recognizes Research as a Necessary Expense of Professor."

The most pertinent statement of the article is as follows:

"On December 30, 1963, the Internal Revenue Service published a formal ruling (#63-275) ending this discrimination against college and university faculty members. The Commissioner has now conceded that 'the duties of a professor, with or without tenure, encompass not only the usual lecture and teaching duties but also the communication and advancement of knowledge through research and publication,' and that expenses incurred in connection therewith are tax deductible."

## Founder's Day Convocation

Three \$1000 faculty awards for "distinguished teaching" and honorary degrees to three Archdiocesan prelates were given at La Salle's annual observance of Founder's Day May 15.

Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees were presented at an afternoon convocation in the College Union to the Rev. John J. Graham, D.D., V.G. Auxiliary Bishop and Vicar General of the Archdiocese, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward T. Hughes, Superintendent of Archdiocesan Schools, and the Rt. Rev. Charles B. Mynaugh, chairman of the Archdiocesan Committee for Television and Radio and Director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. Bishop Graham was Presiding Officer and gave the convocation address. Brother Daniel Bernian, F.S.C., conferred the degrees.

The faculty awards, given at the Founder's Day Dinner held at the Four Chefs Restaurant, were presented to Dr. C. Richard Cleary, professor of Political Science and chairman of the Political Science Department, Michael A. De Angelis, associate professor of Accounting, and Joseph C. Mihalich, assistant professor of Philosophy. Each received \$10000 awards made possible by a \$3000 grant from the Christian R. and Mary F. Lindback Foundation.

Thirty-three academic prizes were presented at the convocation by Brother Gavin Paul, F.S.C., and 37 seniors were inducted into Alpha Epsilon, the alumni honor society.
