ADMISSIONSMEETING & SPEAKERS SLATED
BY BROTHER CHRISTOPHER

Brother Christopher, F.S.C., Director of Admissions, participated in an all day interview meeting sponsored by the National Scholarship Service Fund for Negro Students at the Statler-Hilton Hotel on Saturday, May 11. Negro students were bussed to the hotel at intervals from regions of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Long Island and New Jersey.

Tables were manned by college representatives, who contributed their counseling services during the entire day to the many negro boys and girls who attended.

Brother Christopher, National President of the Assoc. of College Admissions Counselors delivered a luncheon address to the Chesapeake and Potomac Regional ACAC at William & Mary College in Williamsburg, Virginia on Thursday, May 16.

The meeting was attended by all the high school guidance counselors and college admissions officers in Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia. His address was entitled "An Awareness of Our Role as Members of a Profession."

On Tuesday, June 25, Brother Christopher, will preside over a panel discussion at the Fifth Annual Penna. ACAC Conference to be held at Hershey, Pa. for College Admissions Officers and School Counselors.

Brother and four members of the panel will discuss the topic "Positive Suggestions for Closer Counselor--Admissions Office Relations."

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REPRESENTS LA SALLIAN CAPITAL

Mr. James Reilly represented La Salle College at a College Information Program for the Washington, D.C. area, May 20.

The program was held at Archbishop Carroll High School and was attended by more than 2,000 students from the city of Washington and neighboring suburbs of Virginia & Maryland. The purpose was to speak to high school sophomores and juniors, to help motivate them, and to give them sufficient time and information to plan a successful transition from high school to college.

BIOLOGY

PENLLYN BIOSTATION DEDICATION

La Salle will dedicate its new Penllyn Biostation, a unique college-operated facility, at ceremonies this Friday (May 24) at 3:30 P.M. in the Penllyn Natural Area, Penllyn Blue Bell Pike at the Wissahickon Creek in Montgomery County.

Lt. Gov. Raymond J. Broderick will be the principal speaker at the ceremonies, to which the public is invited. Thomas Dolan, president of the Wissahickon Valley Watershed Assoc., and Brother Daniel Bernian, F.S.C., La Salle President, will also take part in the dedication.

Dr. John S. Penny, chairman of the Biology Department that will operate the station, will offer welcoming remarks, and the Rev. T.L. Davis, pastor of Bethlehem Baptist Church, Penllyn, will deliver the invocation.

The biostation, which was erected through grants from the Gulf Oil Corp. and the Scholler Foundation on land donated by the Watershed Assoc., consists of a large laboratory equipped with instruments for ecological studies of the stream's rate of flow and water purity.

TO ATTEND SUMMER SEMINAR

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FELLOWSHIP COMMITTEE

The Fellowship Committee is now receiving nominations of members of the Class of 1969 for Danforth, Fulbright, Marshall, Rhodes and Wilson Fellowships. A form is available for this purpose. If you prefer, you may telephone your nominations to Miss Chervenka or Miss Simms at extension 231.

The campus deadline for receiving nominations is October 1st. All students nominated for these fellowships will be interviewed by the Fellowship Committee in mid-October. Nominees are required to submit the credentials required for these fellowships to a Fellowship Committee member no later than the week of October 1st.

The Fellowship Committee asks that students know the purpose and conditions of the fellowship (s) for which you nominate them. This information is on file in the Counseling Center.

You are asked to bear in mind that candidates for these fellowships should be outstanding students in the judgment of the nominating faculty member. The faculty member eventually will be asked to write a strong defense of his nominees. Without this candidates will have little chance of success regardless of grades and test scores. For the campus screening an oral presentation will suffice, though written evaluations will be welcomed by the Committee.

The Danforth Foundation required Graduate Record Exams. Application forms are available in the Counseling Center. The first GRE administration this Summer will be July 13 (registration closes May 28). It will be administered again October 26 (registration closes Sept. 1968).

The Fellowship Committee recommends that all candidates take the Miller Analogies Test before October 6. The Counseling Center administers this to our own students for a fee of \$3.00. At other test centers in the city the minimum fee is usually \$5.00.

HISTORY

ELECTED CONVENTION DELEGATE

In the April 23rd Pennsylvania Primaries Dr. Arthur L. Hennessy of the History Dept. was elected a Delegate to the Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

Dr. Hennessy ran as a delegate for the candidacy of Senator Eugene Mc Carthy. Hennessy has prepared a position paper on foreign policy for the Pennsylvania-Mc Carthy delegation which now numbers 26 delegates.

Dr. Hennessy was co-chairman of the Committee of Concerned Politics which placed the names of 82 delegates on the ballot in the nine congressional districts of Philadelphia and its suburbs. In the primaries 11 out of a possible 36 won delegate seats for Senator McCarthy. He was also a member of the steering committee for Senator Mc Carthy in the Southeast Pennsylvania area.

On May 1 Dr. Hennessy met with Vice President Hubert Humphrey at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel with a number of other delegates from the Philadelphia area. "The Vice President sends his best regards to the students and faculty here at La Salle," reports Dr. Hennessy.

Dr. Hennessy was also on the Local Arrangement Committee for the Association of Asian Studies National Convention at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel March 21-24, 1968. Twelve La Salle students served as aides during the convention.

AWARD HONORS LATE BROTHER ROBERTS

The Philosophy Department of La Salle College has designated its annual award to the senior with the best record in philosophy as the Brother Augustine Roberts Memorial Award, according to Dr. Joseph C. Mihalich, department chairman.

The award for the best academic average was re-named to honor Brother Roberts, a member of the philosophy department who died April 25 at Jefferson Hospital. The prize is among many given at the annual Founder's Day Convocation on May 15.

Dr. Jerome Carroll, assistant professor, psychology, delivered the keynote address, "Understanding Adolescent Needs," at the First Annual Undergraduate Colloquium in Psychology sponsored by La Salle College's Psi Chi Chapter.

The colloquium, held on May 11, included 12 scientific papers delivered by psychology students from four area colleges including La Salle, Beaver, Chestnut Hill, and Holy Family. Psi Chi is the national honorary society for psychology majors.

Parole Supervision Evaluation

Finn Hornum, Assistant Professor, Sociology, is currently participating with Dr. Marvin Wolfgang of the University of Pennsylvania, in the evaluation of an intensive parole supervision program.

The program was initiated by the Pennsylvania Board of Parole and is funded jointly by the Board of Parole and the Office of Law Enforcement Assistance of the U.S. Department of Justice. The demonstration program is limited to property offenders on parole and the evaluation aims to explore recidivism and general parole adjustment for these offenders.

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TO PRESENT PAPER
