To the LaSalle Community:

At LaSalle, I have found the students and faculty to be both caring and generous in supporting those less fortunate than themselves. It is therefore difficult for me to ask more from those of you already involved with projects assisting the homeless, the sick and the elderly. However, since the United Nations is focusing on the needs of the children, I am asking you to do the same and make a difference in a child's life.

In remembering our days in grammar school, most of us did not have to face crack dealers on street corners, drug-connected shootings in our neighborhoods, abandoned houses and glass-strewn playgrounds. The parish of Sacred Heart is bringing hope to the children who live in such neighborhoods in south Camden. The parish school serves 230 mostly poor and non-Catholic children from many ethnic backgrounds, providing a respite from the bleakness of Camden's inner-city. Teachers are paid minimal salaries, and their jobs have become almost labors of love. The gym, library, extra-curricular activities and maintenance are provided by volunteers from the parish. Little money is received from the diocese because the majority of the students are not Catholic. Each family pays some tuition according to ability (a minimum of \$600 per year), but this payment is a hardship for most. The families make the sacrifice, however, because they believe that Sacred Heart can make a difference in the lives of their children. With tuition and the diocese contribution, the school still has a deficit of \$138,000 for the 1990-1991 academic year.

Surprise, surprise! This is where you come in! We are looking for people to sponsor students for the coming year. A full sponsorship of a student is \$300, while partial sponsorships are \$25 for one month, or any multiple thereof. If you are financially secure, please help a student reach his or her full potential by helping to school to remain open. Fraternities and sororities could sponsor students as part of their continuing service to the community. Any assistance you provide guarantees that these children will have the chance to receive the best education possible and grow up to contribute to their own communities. Checks should be made payable to Sacred Heart, and sent to me at Box 340. If you want to know more about the school, the volunteer programs, the housing rehabilitation projects, or the Sacred Heart parish, please call me at my office (x1491) on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

While I dislike asking for money, the thought of these children not being given the best chance possible to better themselves is worse. If you can, please make a difference!
