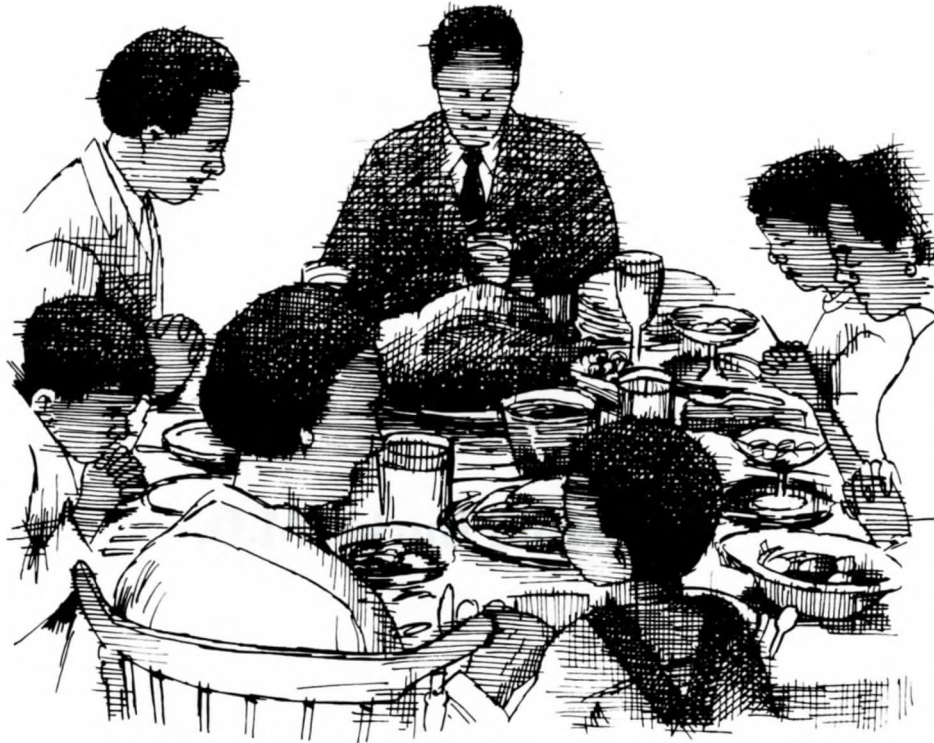

Subj: 20th Street closure ordinance request and related subjects

As most everyone knows by now, La Salle University has requested the tabling of Ordinance 1629 which requested closure of 20th Street between Olney Avenue and Belfield Avenue. On Wednesday morning, November 20, 1991, a telephone call was made to Councilwoman Anna Verna, Chair of the Streets Committee of Council, requesting this action.

The request to table was brought in part by the scurrilous accusations and misstatements promulgated in the flyer distributed throughout the community and posted in the Logan post office. Another factor was an equally unfair presentation at a community meeting on Monday evening, to which La Salle representatives were not invited and to which some students were initially denied admittance.

The presentations at the meeting were at best misleading and in a number of instances untrue and few if any of these spoke to the issues involved in the closing of 20th Street.

For the record, we proceeded on this question with the verbal support of the District Councilman in November of 1989. We withdrew the Ordinance before introduction in 1989 at the request of Streets and Planning in order to assure that all improvements on adjacent streets would be made and paid for by La Salle University before closure could take place if approved. The Ordinance was placed on the desk of Council President Coleman in July of 1990 and it remained there until December 1990 when he turned the documents over to Councilman Cohen with the attached letter to Brother Patrick Ellis, F.S.C., Ph.D., President - (see enclosed letter of 2/8/91). Councilman Cohen refused to introduce the Ordinance having discussed such possibility while meeting with Brother Patrick and John McCloskey in February 1991.

In view of Councilman Cohen's refusal, La Salle University asked Francis Rafferty, Councilman-at-large, to introduce the Ordinance, which he did on November 7, 1991.

The Ordinance request has been temporarily withdrawn, You will be informed when the request is to be reactivated.

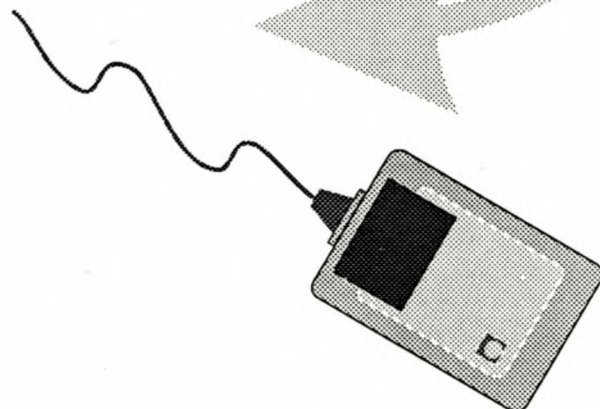
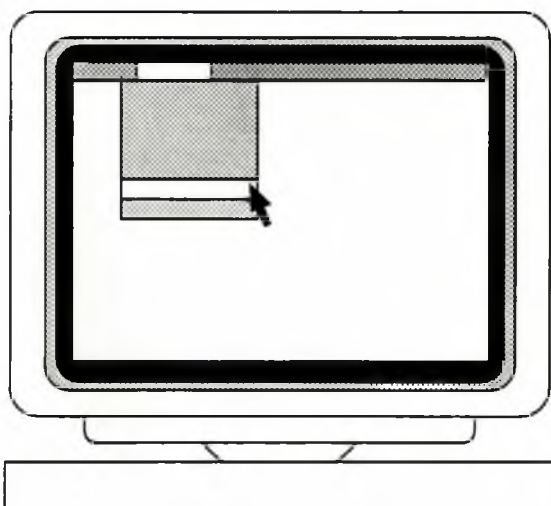
