RE: U.S. News and World Report Ranking

We received word this morning from the publishers of U.S. News and World Report that we have again been selected as one of the best regional universities in the country. Our ranking this year is tenth (up from twelfth last year).

There are 559 colleges and universities nationwide in our classification, and the category is further subdivided by region. Only the 15 top ranked schools in each region make the publication.

The overall ranking was based upon 5 criteria (La Salle's ranking is in parenthesis): academic reputation (11), student selectivity (29), faculty resources (16), financial resources (58), graduation rate (18).

The magazine itself will be available on the newsstands on Tuesday, September 28. Like it or not, this edition is the most popular of the genre, is the top seller of the year for U.S. News, and has enormous publicity potential. For our part, we will be sure to make the information available to prospective students and our other important publics -- beginning with the upcoming Open House on Sunday, October 3.

April 21, 1993

The February 24th and March 22nd minutes were reviewed and accepted with the note that Paul Brazina was present at the March meeting.

Dr. Joseph Kane, Dean of the Business School, presented a request recommending two changes in the undergraduate business program curriculum. The requests for these changes were rooted in the School of Business' bid for accreditation with the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) as well as concerns voiced by former graduates and current students to keep the business education curriculum relevant. It was requested that Psychology 150 be required of all business students to meet the AACSB recommendation for a introductory behavioral science course. This course would take the place of an elective course. It was also requested that students be required to take an oral communication course in the Core II area to address concerns with student oral communication skills. Communication 254 - Public Speaking was recommended to fulfill this need. Considerable discussion ensued. Specifically, there were concerns that the liberal arts core would be eroded by such changes. Alternative suggestions were offered and their merits discussed in relation to the School of Business' upcoming bid for accreditation. As a result, the Curriculum Committee recommended that Psychology 150 and Communication 254 become controlled electives. However, a strong recommendation was made that the School of Business review the possibility of meeting student need for improved oral communication and interpersonal skill strategies by integrating oral communication and interpersonal skill development within the department current courses. This suggestion should be considered during the School's self-study.

The Provost and the Committee reviewed the current draft of "General Education Goal Statement". It was determined that the document needs to be reviewed by a wider faculty and then student audience. Several suggestions were made including presentation of the document during the September faculty workshop with the possibility of break out groups for document discussion.

The Provost provided an update on student barriers to learning.

John Baky will continue to work on accessing appropriate literature through the summer. This item will be placed on the fall agenda. A review of "Teaching from a Pluralistic/Global Perspective" will also be slated for the fall agenda.

The Provost extended his appreciation the members of the Curriculum Committee for their time and efforts during the year.

The technology support for faculty centers on: expanding the campus-wide data-network to all faculty offices and classrooms; upgrading (most) faculty computing hardware; and bringing our video-network to selected classrooms and faculty meeting areas.

The aforementioned projects involve "off-the-shelf" technology. We are also exploring ideas whose implementation details are not as well defined; for example, using technology to improve faculty non-teaching activities (department newsletter publishing, meeting coordination, resource availability and sharing, etc.). We are attempting to establish a "smart" classroom / meeting room which will allow and encourage active participation from all attendees. We are exploring the use of special computer-based labs which are more tightly integrated with the instruction / learning process. Operationally, in order to improve delivery of technology-based services to faculty and students, we are establishing a clearer relationship between instructional areas on campus that are

This fall the Writing Center is again open during limited evening hours. On Tuesday and Wednesday evenings the Center will be open from 5:15 to 6:45. While appointments are recommended for these evening sessions, students can still see a tutor on a "drop-in" basis if space is available. Since Continuing Studies students in particular cannot always manage to use the Center's services during the day, please let your evening students know about these evening times.

In addition, during the weeks preceding and following midterms, the Center is conducting a series of study skills workshops. The workshops are designed to help students read and study more efficiently and effectively. In the reading skills workshop, for example, students learn how to remember more than the 20% they would normally retain 24 hours after reading. (The key is to read in such a way as to move information into long term memory instead of only into short term memory.)

A workshop schedule is attached so that you may pass along this information to your students.
