ADMISSIONS OFFICE UPDATE

Final plans are underway for the "Discover the Difference, Personally" programs which will be held on April 2 and April 9. Each academic department has been contacted, and we are grateful for the responses we have received so far. DDP is our last, best opportunity to convince the students we have admitted that La Salle is the right institution for their undergraduate education. These families want to talk with everyone **except** the admissions staff. We have provided them with as much information as possible, and now they want to hear from faculty and students about all that La Salle has to offer.

Our ability to successfully reach our enrollment goals is dependent on a properly organized, meaningful experience for prospective students and their parents at DDP. And, the success of our DDP programs is dependent on significant attendance by faculty and students. Remember, these families are visiting several institutions during the coming weeks, and the last impression we make must be the best impression. Please ask students who you have contact with to volunteer one or two Sunday afternoons. We believe we need approximately 125 student volunteers for each weekend, and we currently have about 50. **Please ask interested students to contact Jennifer Service in the Admissions Office at extension 1500.**

Through March 15, we have processed a total of 2,579 applications (a 1.4% increase over last year). We have also admitted slightly more than 2,000 applicants to date. Both of these figures are slightly ahead of the moderate forecast. Academic quality appears to be slightly stronger than the past couple of years. Our ability to meet the enrollment goals will depend on how well we convert our admitted students into enrollees. Financial Aid packages are due to go out next week, and we believe that we will be much more competitive in meeting the financial needs of our applicants. Generally, we feel cautiously optimistic, however we know that DDP and the quality of our aid packages will determine how successful we will be.

MINUTES, MEETING # 9
FEBRUARY 21, 1995

The meeting was called to order by the President of the Senate at 2:35pm.

A motion to approve the amended Senate minutes of the January 30, 1995 meeting was made. The vote was 11 for approval and 0 against with no abstentions.

In response to a request by the Senate, the President had obtained a generic copy of the buy-out agreement. He said that the Senate did not want to offer a legal opinion about the contracts, because they are private agreements between individuals and the University, but that with the possible exception of the clause regarding a 10% additional penalty for disclosure of the details of the agreement, it seemed to be a fairly standard buy-out agreement. He reported that there was no hesitation on the administration's part to give this to him.

The Committee on Committees then brought business to the Senate regarding appointments. The Senate appointed a faculty representative to the search for a new Alumni Director. The Committee on Committees is trying to update its database and will continue to contact faculty members who have not responded as yet to the request for their committee preferences and history.

The President then discussed the RIF document and the buy-out situation. President Burke informed the President of the faculty senate in writing that Reduction in Force policy did not supersede the Handbook's policies regarding faculty terminations. The Senate President also stated that apparently the voluntary buy-outs are working well and there should therefore be no need for further faculty reductions. However, there was not as much information currently available on the status of administrative buy-outs. A Senator stressed that the Senate has been clear that Reductions in Force need to start at the administrative, not the staff level. The Senate President responded by stating that he understood that 46 administrative slots, 24 of which are currently empty, will be eliminated. Other Senators asked why the RIF document was not written more clearly and why it was not clear to whom it pertained. Yet another Senator remarked that the administrators who are affected by RIF or buy out opportunities should not be the ones who provide faculty support, especially at off-campus sites. The President of the Senate remarked that the process of administrative restructuring is still going on, and that faculty should not be too quick to draw conclusions about it.

Next, there was a discussion of the relationship between the firm offering out-placement counseling and the Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences. (The out-placement counseling is being offered to employees who are separating from the University.) The President reported that the Dean and the Vice President for Business Affairs had informed him that the Dean of Arts and Sciences had no prior knowledge that her husband's firm had been one of the firms asked to bid on this contract, that the decision to choose that firm was made by the Business Office without her involvement, and that neither she nor her husband would derive any personal benefit from this transaction. It was her desire to remove even the perception of a conflict of interest. To that end, she is planning a meeting in the near future. There was further Senate discussion of other possible

conflict-of-interest situations that have occurred in the past, such as University contracts with firms managed or owned by members of the Board of Trustees.

This led back to a discussion of the buy-outs. One Senator suggested that certain benefits be extended to faculty members who choose to accept the offered buy-outs. He suggested items such as gym and library access, maintaining computer accounts and the opportunity for such individuals to be offered emeritus status. While there was general agreement with his point, it was noted that the power to propose emeritus status rests with the individual Departments. Another Senator also noted that retired faculty are no longer listed in the telephone directory. People should not be made to feel as though they've been discarded. The President mentioned that the Provost spoke of a possible farewell event to be held toward the end of the term. The Provost also stressed that the buy-out process had a positive outcome. A Senator responded by saying that although that was true, the way in which the process proceeded was negative, citing the legalistic vs Lasallian values and a sense of unnecessary secrecy. There is a need to refocus on "core values", both Lasallian values and the values of higher learning. Another Senator noted that while legal advice is important, it is merely advice. Legal issues need to be evaluated in the light of morality, ethics, effectiveness and humanity. Legal advice does not need to "rule". Finally it was observed, the Senate needs to be aware that not only faculty are going through this process. It is essential that the faculty not be perceived as receiving considerations which other separating employees will not receive. The Senate requested that the members of University Council present to Council the a list of benefits which should be extended to those who accepted the buy-outs.

The President then discussed another issue raised during his meeting with the Provost. There is a plan to merge the Continuing Studies administration and curriculum with Day school departments. A Senator asked that input be solicited from faculty who understand the curricular and operational issues involved in handling the Continuing Studies programs.

A Senator asked if others were having trouble with instructional supplies budgets. The President observed that the FAC proposal requested that department chairs be included in the budgeting process. Another Senator cited the inadequacy of duplicating budgets. Another complained about equipment repair, sometimes three projectors need to be tried before an operating projector is found. Where the faculty meet the students, there needs to be adequate funding. The budget process needs to be realistic. Another Senator observed that there needs to be a mechanism so that a chairperson who finds his/her budget to be inadequate can notify the Provost or University Council.

The next item discussed was the issue of partial retirement. A faculty member who chooses partial retirement under the present system takes up a budget line and prevents new hires, and is relatively expensive to the University. The formula for qualifying is also being changed from age greater than or equal to 50 plus years of service greater than or equal to 20 (needing to equal 70), to a new target of an age of 60 plus 20 years of service (a total of at least 80.) A proposal is being formulated that would limit partial retirement to a set period of time, such as three years.

Under new business a chart was presented which shows the remarkable growth in the number of full-time administrators over a ten year period, while faculty numbers were stable and enrollment numbers fell. One Senator asked for more specifics, as some staff are fully funded with outside money, while another mentioned that in that time frame, University status was gained. The presenting Senator said it would be further examined.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:05pm.

**Academic Affairs Committee
Minutes of the February 28, 1995 Meeting**

Minutes of the January 24, 1995 meeting were approved.

M.S. in Investment Analysis and Management Accounting

This proposal returned to the Committee for Stage III in the approval process. Dr. Walter Schubert, Chair of the Finance Department, provided an overview of the main sections of the proposal and of the three issues raised by Graduate Council during Stage II of the approval process. These three issues, summarized in a cover Memo submitted with the proposal, deal with:

- * financing the attainment of faculty credentials
- * on-going faculty development
- * scholarship support.

The ensuing discussion focused on these three issues in part because they represent a departure from current practice at La Salle. If approved, these three components would apportion a share of the degree program revenue to specific uses associated with the program. If these proposals were approved for this M.S. program, it would seem necessary that the same practice be examined for other graduate programs.

In response to the discussion, Dr. Schubert indicated that the M.S. program is intended to have a smaller but higher qualified student body. It is intended to be a low cost program using MBA Program courses as a base. Thus there is the need to support it through limited student scholarships and faculty professional credentialing and development. It was his sense that the Finance Department may not want the program to be implemented without these components.

It was agreed that there should be a clearer statement of the policy implications of the proposed changes. A policy statement will be developed and brought back to the committee for further consideration. In the meantime, further discussion of the M.S. program will be postponed.

Undergraduate Major in Environmental Studies

Dr. Henry Bart, Chair of the Department of Geology and Physics presented a proposal for Stage I consideration for an undergraduate major in Environmental Studies. Dr. Bart indicated that while La Salle does have a Minor in this area, recent information has convinced him that there is enough demand from employers and from potential students that such a major would be viable.

Information on all of the Stage I criteria was supplied in the proposal. Dr. Bart indicated that while the major is heavy on science requirements and would require 17 courses all of them are courses already offered. No additional faculty would be required.

There was an extended discussion about the curriculum of the major. In particular the adequacy of the amount of chemistry required was questioned. The possibility of developing alternative tracks within the program as it develops to accommodate these kinds of concerns was considered.

After the discussion concluded a motion to approve the proposal for Stage I was affirmed, 11-1-0.

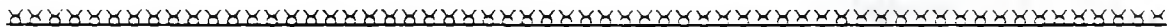
