RE: Task Force on Building Community

Last semester, following several incidents on campus, I announced that I was establishing a Task Force on Building Community. The task force is now in operation, and I am writing to inform you about it.

The task force was established to:

1. Recommend curricular and co-curricular ways in which we can educate everyone at La Salle to the values and legacy of Saint John Baptist De La Salle and the worldwide Lasallian family.
2. Recommend curricular and co-curricular ways in which we can educate everyone at La Salle about the deleterious and corrosive effects of intolerance.
3. Recommend policies and procedures to deal with actions that are expressions of intolerance.

I have appointed the following persons to the task force: Rosemary Barbera, Suzanne Boyll, Brother Miguel Campos, Cynthia Capers, Preston Feden, Joseph Gillespie, Elizabeth Lescalleet, Jimmy McDonough, Rochelle Peterson, Cherylyn Rush, and June Smith. I have asked Brother Miguel to chair the task force. Other faculty, students, and staff have been identified to serve as resources to the task force. The task force has been meeting for several months now, and a preliminary report is expected by the end of the semester. Feel free to contact members of the task force with your observations or suggestions.

Perhaps a comment on the philosophy that informs the task force is in order. Community is more than a noun. It is an ongoing action. Here at La Salle we build community together in those "spaces" in which students, staff, faculty, administrators, and neighbors interact with one another. Sometimes our conversation is strident and tense as we experience negative divisive forces: impediments to community. Other times, however, we experience La Salle at its best, as we build an institutional culture characterized by civility and mutual respect.

The places in which we continually interact to build community are connected with wider spaces, a global community, a worldwide network of schools, colleges, and universities conducted under the auspices of the Christian Brothers. All of us draw our common inspiration and hope from a common memory, the life and teachings of John Baptist De La Salle. At the heart of the 300 year tradition of the Brothers is the experience of "association for mission," a community in which all the individuals are treated with respect, where all the individuals are valued.

Therefore, we need to reinforce our connection with those values of the Lasallian tradition and to build and celebrate our Lasallian learning community: a community that is, in the words of Ernest Boyer, purposeful, open, just, disciplined, and caring.

## Minutes of the Faculty Senate Meeting January 26, 1996

**Present:** William Grosnick, Patty Gerrity, Gary Clabaugh, Steve Meisel, Emery Mollenhauer, Zane Wolf, Kathleen McNichol, Elizabeth Paulin, Joe Volpe, Scott Stickel, Marjorie Allen, Prafulla Joglekar, Preston Feden, David George, Michael Kerlin, Marianne Gauss, John Duffy, Paul Brazina, Cynthia Capers

### **Ugras Resignation:**

The Senate President began the meeting by announcing the resignation of Joseph Ugras from the Senate due to his appointment as Associate Dean of the Business School.

### **Minutes:**

The minutes of the November 30, 1995 were approved as corrected. 14 yes 4 abstentions

### **Committee on Committees:**

Professor Joglekar, Chair of the Committee on Committees, next led a discussion of the composition of the restructured Graduate Council. The discussion largely concerned whether faculty were adequately represented. The discussion led to the following two motions:

**Motion** 1. In order to comply with University council and Graduate Council resolutions, the Senate will ask that John Smith, Anne Walsh and James Smither be non-voting members of the Graduate Council for the remainder of 1995-1996.

**Motion** 2: To ensure continuity, the term of faculty appointments on Graduate Council should be extended from two to three years.

Vote Yes: 15 No: 0 Abstain: 3

Senate President Grosnick will also seek clarification regarding the definition of "administrator" and "faculty".

### **Non-Tenure English Department Position:**

The Senate next reviewed the English Department Chairperson Butler's request for approval of a non-tenure track position. A discussion followed. It primarily involved concerns about a "chipping away" of tenure. The position was approved 16 Yes 0 no 2 abstentions.

### **President Burke:**

The senate next conducted a dialogue with Brother President Burke.

### **Thanks for Faculty:**

The President led off his remarks by expressing his appreciation for faculty participation in various aspects of university governance.

### **Pay Increase**

Noting past sacrifices of faculty and staff, the President indicated he was strongly supporting the pay increase advocated by FAP. (The amount of this proposal remains privileged for the moment.)

### **Proactive Management:**

A Senator asked the President if the University was becoming more proactive in enhancing revenue as well as reducing costs. The President responded that there was a new emphasis on revenue enhancement with a particular emphasis on giving. He also indicated a number of other initiatives, such as the expansion of Graduate Programming, were also under consideration.

### **Grants:**

Asked if further consideration had been given to facilitating grant proposals by appointing a resource person, the president indicated that this is still unsettled. He added that the desirability of such facilitation is obvious, but cost containment generates constant pressure not to add staff.

### **Community Services:**

The president was next asked about a rumored withdrawal of University support from Community Services. He responded that cuts in Federal Funding were jeopardizing some Federally funded positions and activities. However, there are no plans to cut University support for community service programming. Community services, the President added, are part and parcel of the mission of the University.

### **Advertising**

Queried about the possibility of institutions of higher education cooperating to reduce spending on advertising, the President responded that this is not presently under discussion.

### **Class Size**

Asked how large classes can become before giving the lie to our boast of "small classes," the President remarked that further economies must be exercised in some sections to insure more individual attention in the remainder.

### **Recruitment and Retention**

Quizzed about how recruitment and retention were going, the President indicated that thus far, the recruitment situation is generally satisfactory. Anecdotal evidence also suggests above average success in retention of this year's Freshman class.

### **Misestimation of Tuition Revenue**

Questioned about the present financial situation, the President explained that a misestimation of revenues has led to a \$600,000 shortfall in estimated tuition revenue. The budget, however, remains in the black.

### **Endowment Revenues**

Asked about our present endowment income, the President reported a 22% return on the endowment during the last year.

### **Holroyd and Hayman Hall**

In response to a question about the status of Holroyd renovations, the President indicated its renovation has been authorized. Regarding the Hayman expansion, the President indicated the administration has been authorized to obtain firm estimates.

### **Student Loans**

Asked if we are lobbying Congress to preserve student loans, the President said "yes." Efforts are also under way to preserve state loans and to convince Commonwealth officials that Penn State's plans for a Philadelphia region 4 year branch campus are unwise.



**20th Street**

Questioned about the 20th Street closing, the President indicated further progress has been made.

**Parking**

Queried about plans for improving parking, the President noted he would like to expand parking on South Campus when funds become available.

With thanks to the President, the meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.

I wanted to share some good news about the Academic Discovery Program's current freshmen because hard work should be always be acknowledged. Although we have had many successful ADP freshman classes in the past, this past semester the ADP freshmen performed exceptionally well, earning a mean GPA of 2.69. Twelve of our thirty-five freshmen had GPAs above 3.0, with the top three holding GPAs of 3.7, 3.62, and 3.5. Only three students had GPAs below 2.0.

What makes the accomplishments of our ADP freshmen, and indeed of all our ADP students, so meaningful is that they worked so hard to earn their grades, despite the many obstacles most of them face every day of their lives. Keep in mind too that all ADP students do not meet the traditional SAT requirements for admission to La Salle, even though their class rankings compare favorably with other La Salle students. ADP students are also fighting the effects of poverty: most of our students have adjusted annual family incomes under \$18,450.

So we applaud their performance. It has been very gratifying for the entire ADP staff to work with these wonderful freshmen.

### ***Classical Approaches to Teaching: Lecture***

This workshop will examine a classical approach to teaching -- the lecture. There is little question that lecture is the most widely used technique at the university level, and it certainly has its place among our teaching techniques. During this workshop, the strengths and limitations of lecture will be explored, and ways to enhance lecture will be offered. Together, we will view a taped lecture and then listen to the reactions of two Lindback Award winners, Ed Sheehy and George Shalhoub. Both Ed and George have mastered this form of instruction. A general discussion will ensue, and discipline-specific questions will be entertained. Some practical suggestions for improving lectures will be offered. Finally, a quick "tour" of resources available in the Teaching and Learning Center, along with a set of handouts about lecture for each participant, will close the session.


La Salle University's Institute of Language and Culture is pleased to announce a five-week intensive "English as a Second/Foreign Language" program which will be offered this summer.

The Pennsylvania Literacy Corps is a partnership between higher education and adult basic and literacy education. Colleges and universities work together with community literacy providers to train college students to work effectively as volunteers in local literacy services. Since the Urban Center currently provides Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language classes for 135 students, we are interested in bringing the grant to the university.

Higher education institutions are required to develop and offer college credit courses designed to provide college students with the background knowledge and practical skills they need to perform their role as volunteers. Literacy Corps courses can be offered through any department or academic discipline. Students are required to perform 40 hours of community service. The maximum award for this grant is \$35,000.

--Teaching and advising in an intensive week-long AEP orientation program at the end of August; this program requires the instructor to stay in the residence halls during that week.

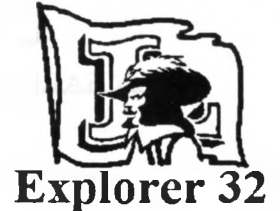
