RE: Planning Initiatives

Planning initiatives in Academic and Student Affairs, begun last year with the support of Greg Bruce, have been continuing during the 1995-96 academic year, largely through the Academic Affairs Committee and various other standing and ad hoc committees. A significant number of people are involved in the process as members of these committees.

The Faculty Meeting on March 13 was an effort to pull all of these related initiatives together to provide an overview of the entire planning effort.

Recently the Middle States Self-Study Steering Committee has made seven priority recommendations as the result of the self-study process. There is significant overlap between these recommendations and the planning initiatives. This overlap reinforces the need for moving ahead with the planning initiatives.

The following is a very brief summary of the planning initiatives reviewed at the faculty meeting.

Primary planning initiatives:

- * learning goals and assessment
 - currently under discussion by the Academic Affairs Committee
 - overlaps with MSA recommendation # 1

- * curriculum revision
 - currently under discussion by the Curriculum Committee
 - overlaps with MSA recommendation # 2

- * improved utilization of faculty resources
 - currently under discussion by the Ad Hoc Committee, the Planning and Budgeting Advisory Committee (PBAC), and Council of Deans
 - overlaps with MSA recommendations # 3 & 4

Supporting initiatives:

- * teaching methodologies
 - currently under discussion in the Teaching and Learning Center and in IAMST
 - overlaps with MSA recommendation # 7

- * distance learning
 - currently under discussion by the Ad Hoc Distance Learning Group, the Teaching and Learning Center, and the Instructional Technology Group

- * Program Review
 - under implementation in all three Schools and being reviewed by Academic Affairs Committee and Curriculum Committee

- * continued support for faculty development
 - currently under discussion by Faculty Development Committee and Leaves and Grants Committee

Since the results of planning affect all of us, everyone should have an opportunity to provide input periodically into the planning discussions. I would thus urge you to share your views with members of any of the committees identified above.

I believe strongly that these are the directions in which we should be moving in the Academic and Student Affairs Area. But I very much want the opportunity to hear your views, pro and con, on any aspects of this ongoing planning effort. To help this to happen, I would like to meet in a small group setting with those of you who have an interest in these issues. I would thus invite you to call my secretary, Donna (x1015), and leave your name. Or return the form at the bottom of the page through campus mail. We will arrange one or more mutually convenient times depending on schedules and the number of individuals who want to discuss their views.

PROFILES OF WOMEN IN COMMUNITY SERVICE

Kelly Crankshaw-McLaughlin, '93

Kelly was an indispensable member of a number of campus groups while at La Salle University. She was the Coordinator for the La Salle Organization Caring for Kids (LOCK). Before becoming Coordinator, she was Treasurer of this organization. Kelly helped move this organization from fundraising to hands-on experiences by organizing various activities and programs such as a tutoring program in conjunction with Dignity Housing. Kelly was also instrumental in the initiation of a mentoring program for at-risk teens, run through Voyage House in South Philadelphia.

Ms. Crankshaw-McLaughlin was a member of the La Salle Committee for the Homeless. She served on the Steering Committee of this organization, and was an integral part of the decision-making body. She was an Outreach Volunteer, bringing food and friendship to homeless men and women in the streets of Philadelphia. She was a participant in Project Appalachia and Coordinator for Week of Hope. And, she was involved in the La Salle newspaper, the *Collegian*, as well as other activities.

During her time at La Salle, Ms. Crankshaw realized that her community service activities, more than her classes, were leading her to her vocation. She studied psychology, and graduate maximum cum laude, yet she felt her growth happened more outside of the classroom than inside. She gained a clear picture of social problems and the political situations which cause those problems and became a strong advocate for justice; that is, changing

social structures which help perpetuate poverty and injustice. The University recognized her outstanding contributions in this area by awarding her the Brother Emery Mollenhauer Award for Justice in her senior year.

Kelly chose to look for work which would not only be meaningful to her, but also meaningful to society. She is presently working with the Clean Air Council in Philadelphia. She continues to remain committed to social issues through her environmental work and activities outside of work. She plans to always work in the non-profit sector and continue to contribute to society.

Dorothy Day

Dorothy Day was the founder of the Catholic Worker Movement. She grew up in a working class home in Chicago and identified strongly with workers and the poor of this country. She was very politically active in a number of social issues. As Dan Berrigan said of her: "She joined issues to life."

In her 30's Dorothy converted to Catholicism. In the Roman Catholic Church she found a home for her idealism and adversary style. She followed the social teachings of the Catholic Church, and questioned the authorities of the Church when they did not live out the teachings. Dorothy recognized and named the sins of her Church, yet remained faithful to it.

Dorothy considered all persons to be equal. She took a voluntary vow of poverty to share in the plight of the poor and dispossessed. She opened her home to those who had no home. For her, Incarnation was an on-going fact. We could not know God without knowing our neighbors, especially our poor neighbors as Jesus had known poverty, homelessness, exile and torture.

Helene Grady, '93

Helene Grady was a member of the LaSalle Committee for the Homeless, where she was Coordinator of Homeless Outreach and a member of the Steering Committee and where she served as Coordinator for the Committee. She was an effective and wise leader.

For Helene, unlike some students, her commitment was year-round; she continued doing Homeless Outreach on a weekly basis even during breaks and vacations. This commitment, coupled with her outstanding academic achievements, led to Helene's being named a recipient of the prestigious Harry Truman Scholarship.

Another program which Helene was instrumental in coordinating and founding is the Annual Turkey and Canned Goods Delivery to neighborhood families. This program came about because of Helene's preoccupation with the fact that the majority of community service activities in which LaSalle students were participating were based in other neighborhoods, while the neighbors in this community also were in need of some assistance.

After graduating from La Salle, Ms. Grady worked on President Clinton's Working Group on Welfare Reform. She is truly an advocate for those who have been oppressed and has a real understanding of the issues involved in policy making and in the political arena. She is presently studying at the John F. Kennedy School at Harvard University. She plan to continue to be involved in the public sector, influencing and making policy which will benefit the poor.

Rigoberta Menchu


Rigoberta Menchu won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1992. The following is excerpted from her book: My name is Rigoberta Menchu. This is my testimony. I'd like to stress that it is not only my life, it's also the testimony of my people. My story is the story of all poor Guatemalans. My personal experience is the reality of a whole people. Our ancestors were murdered and tortured because they were Indians. We began studying the Bible more deeply and, well, we came to a conclusion: That

being a Christian means thinking of those around us, and that every one of our Indian race has the right to eat. God said that on this earth we have the right to what we need. We realized that it is not God's will that we should live in suffering, that God did not give us that destiny, that others on earth have imposed this suffering, poverty, misery, and discrimination on us.

In 1979, I remember, my youngest brother died, the first person in my family to be tortured. He was 16 years old. On 9 September, 1979 my brother was kidnapped. It was Sunday. They took him and he walked about two kilometers being kicked and hit all the time. They took him away, bleeding from different places. When they'd done with him, he didn't look like a person any more. They inflicted terrible tortures on him. Day and night they subjected him to terrible, terrible pain. Eventually they buried him alive in front of members of the family and community, as a lesson.

My father was also burned to death when he occupied the Spanish embassy with a group in November, 1979. The objective was to tell the whole world what was happening in Guatemala and inform people inside the country as well. The only thing that was left of them was their ashes.

In April, 1980 my mother was kidnapped. And from the very beginning she was raped by the town's high-ranking army officers. They then took my mother to the same place they had tortured my little brother. They eventually left her to die, after countless tortures and rapes, in a field, in terrible agony.

"Science is my favorite class..."
The development and Implementation of IMS 150

Join Dave Smith, Bert Strieb, Nancy Jones, Tom McPhillips, and education majors for a discussion of IMS 150, a new interdisciplinary course offered under the auspices of the IAMST. In addition to being interdisciplinary, this course was conducted using active learning strategies and collaborative learning methods. Discussion will focus on the planning and implementation of this course, especially in light of student needs and the challenges of interdisciplinary team teaching. Students will describe their experiences in the course, and their evaluation of the approach used to teach them core ideas in science. Video clips will show some of the learning activities used by the teachers.

This roundtable is NOT for science faculty ONLY! Any faculty member interested in active learning strategies and interdisciplinary teaching will find this session informative. So come and join us. Bring a bag lunch. Coffee, soda, and pretzels are provided.

Fostering Active Learning: Asking Good Questions

Research has shown that, in the typical classroom, many faculty questions go unanswered and a very high percentage of student responses come from a very small percentage of students. Further, research suggests that the way in which questions are framed influences the level and type of student thinking which results. This workshop, led by Bob Vogel, will help faculty to design questions that will involve more students in class discussion *and* in higher-level thinking. A set of handouts on questioning in the classroom will be distributed to each attendee.
