THE FACULTY SENATE

Minutes of May 17, 1999 AM

The meeting was called to order at 9:37 AM. The minutes of the Senate meeting of April 15, 1999 were approved as written (14-0-1).

The Committee on Committees presented their choices for remaining vacancies on several University standing committees. Each nomination was presented to the full Senate for discussion, followed by a vote on each individual nomination. Due to a significant increase in workload, the Judiciary Committee has requested an expansion from five to six faculty members. This would allow the committee to split into two subgroups that would then meet every other week, each with three faculty members. A motion to add one faculty member on an ad hoc basis to the Judiciary Committee, pending formal approval by University Council in September, was approved (17-0-1). The ad hoc nominee was then presented by the Committee on Committees, and accepted by the Senate.

A report on the recent Senate elections was made by the Senate Vice-President. Some electoral issues were discussed, with suggestions to address those issues deferred to the Executive Committee of the incoming Senate.

A report on the two-day Trustees' Retreat was presented by the faculty representatives who attended the retreat. The Senate passed a motion (20-0-1) to print the report in Campus News in order to make all faculty are aware of the issues raised at the meeting.

The current status of the grievance policy was discussed. The outgoing and incoming Executive Committees will work on the policy over the summer to address those concerns with legitimacy which were raised by the Deans and chairpersons. The Committees will then meet with the Provost, and present the final policy to the Senate at the September Senate meeting. If approved by the Senate, the policy will then go to University Council in October. A motion to remand the policy to both Executive Committees, with the revised policy presented to the Senate in September was passed (18-1-2).

A clarification of the nomination process for the Provost's Distinguished Faculty Award was requested. A motion was passed stating that anyone with faculty status is eligible to make a nomination for the award (20-0-1).

The discussion of improving the assessment of teaching quality was continued from the last Senate meeting. A subgroup of the Faculty Development Committee is working on outcomes assessment, and will be invited to the September Senate meeting to report on their work to date.

The Senate formally thanked its outgoing President for her hard work and dedication during the past two years.

The Senate adjourned its morning session at 12:22 PM.

SUBJECT: Model United Nations (MUN)/Open Meeting

Would you please encourage your students to consider joining us for our upcoming informational meeting? It will be held on **Tuesday, October 5, 1999, at 12:30 pm, in the Multicultural and International Center (1923 Olney Avenue, across from College Hall)**. Please feel free to join us yourself, as well, at this meeting to learn more about MUN and to meet our students who competed last year.

As its name implies, MUN is a simulation of the United Nations. It is a worldwide system of conferences, mostly in the U.S. but also in other countries, where students represent nations and diplomats in debating current global issues over the course of a day or a few days. La Salle's International Relations Council (the Model UN team) plans to participate in the 33rd annual University of Pennsylvania Model United Nations Conference (UPMUNC), which will be held in November. UPMUNC is the world's largest collegiate conference in the fall semester, with nearly 60 colleges and universities from across the U.S. and Canada (including schools like Harvard, MIT, and the University of California at Berkeley).

Depending on the number of delegates a school sends (a few send more than 50), schools are assigned a country or countries to represent and individual delegates are assigned to committees. To prepare for the conference, students do research on the country they are representing and write position papers on the two or three issues before their respective committees. Awards are given for outstanding delegates and delegations. The experience does wonders for students – helping them develop their critical thinking, communication, and interpersonal skills, their base of knowledge, enthusiasm for learning, etc.

This past Spring our team was comprised of ten students who represented Swaziland at the National Model United Nations Conference in New York City. The students came back with a great deal of enthusiasm and are eager to start their preparation for this Fall's conference. There are still a few spaces available for La Salle's delegation, so please encourage your students to consider participating.
