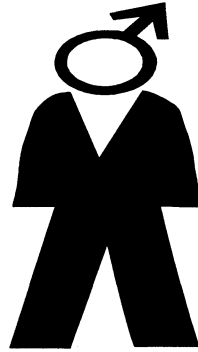

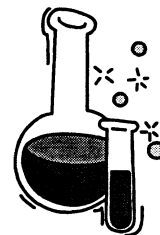


Dear Friend of Project Rainbow,



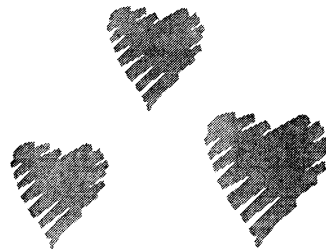

The American novel began in Philadelphia with the late-eighteenth-century works of Charles Brockden Brown. In Edgar Allan Poe, the city claimed—at least for part of his life—one of the next century’s foremost writers. And La Salle-connected Philadelphian Owen Wister wrote the western novel *The Virginian*, which is said to be the best selling novel of the period 1900-1950. But the center of the American literary world has in the Twentieth Century shifted to New York.

Recently, however, a renaissance has occurred in Philadelphia fiction. Old stereotypes sometimes remain: aristocratic and wealthy Main Line mansions (say, Katherine Hepburn in the movie *Philadelphia Story*) opposed to cramped South Philadelphia rowhouses (all those *Rocky* movies). But such artificial categories are finding fresh interpretations in the exciting new wave of Philadelphia novelists, many of them African-American writers.
