My name is Joe Curley, I am a graduate student of history here at La Salle University and I am interviewing Mr. Arthur Grover, the Director of Security and Safety at La Salle University. 6. What types of things would your family do together such as trips, vacations, sporting events and so on?
7. Where was your neighborhood? What was it like while growing up?
8. Where did you go to elementary school?
9. Where did you go to high school?
10. Academically, what type of student were you? What subjects did you enjoy?
11. What did you like doing during your free time? Sports, hobbies, or anything like that?
12. I know you are a graduate of La Salle University, can you tell me how you decided to go to college and why did you choose La Salle?

13. Were you a full or part time student?
14. Did you live on campus or did you commute?
15. What do you recall of your first impressions of La Salle, the campus, the buildings and so on?
16. About the surrounding neighborhood, what was it like when you were here as a student?
17. What do you remember about the atmosphere here on campus at that time? Politically, socially, academically?
18. I recall your major was Criminal Justice, how did you come to choose that field of study?
19. What were your plans following graduation?
20. When did you join the Philadelphia Police Department?
21. What was it like going through the Police Academy at that time as compared to now?
22. Where did you go after graduating from the academy?
23. What was that like? What were some of your first assignments?
24. What did you think about being a patrol officer?
25. What do you recall of the public's perception of police officers at that time?
26. What was the police culture like at that time? How did the officers interact with each other and their supervisors?
27. As a patrol officer in your district, what types of crimes or incidents would you typically encounter?
28. Could you tell me about some of your assignments as you rose through the ranks of the department?
29. How did you see your interaction with public and subordinate officers evolve as you moved from first line supervisor towards command level assignments?

30. During your long career with the Police Department what were some of the major events you were involved with? (Move confrontations, sports championships and so on)
31. How did you see the department changing over the years? What trends did you see, good and bad?
32. I know that you are married and have children. What are their names?
33. I also know your wife was an officer as well. How did you manage your schedules as supervisors and still raise a family?
34. What are some of the challenges that “police families” may face, that more traditional 9-5 working families do not?
35. As a command level officer, what were some of the career development schools you attended? (FBI Academy, Northwestern University, etc.)
36. What did commanders get professionally from attending these schools?
37. Early in your career, what was it like being an officer on patrol with a college degree? Did you get any negative reactions from veteran officers?
38. As you moved through the ranks of the department, did you see a change in the attitudes towards officers who continued with their educations?
39. Your final assignment with the Police Department was as the captain of the Police Academy, what did you enjoy most about that position?
40. After you retired from the Police Department, what made you want to return to La Salle?
41. Upon your arrival here, what did you think of the Security and Safety Department? What were some of the issues that called for your early attention?
42. Remembering back to your time here as a student how had the campus and surrounding neighborhood changed?
