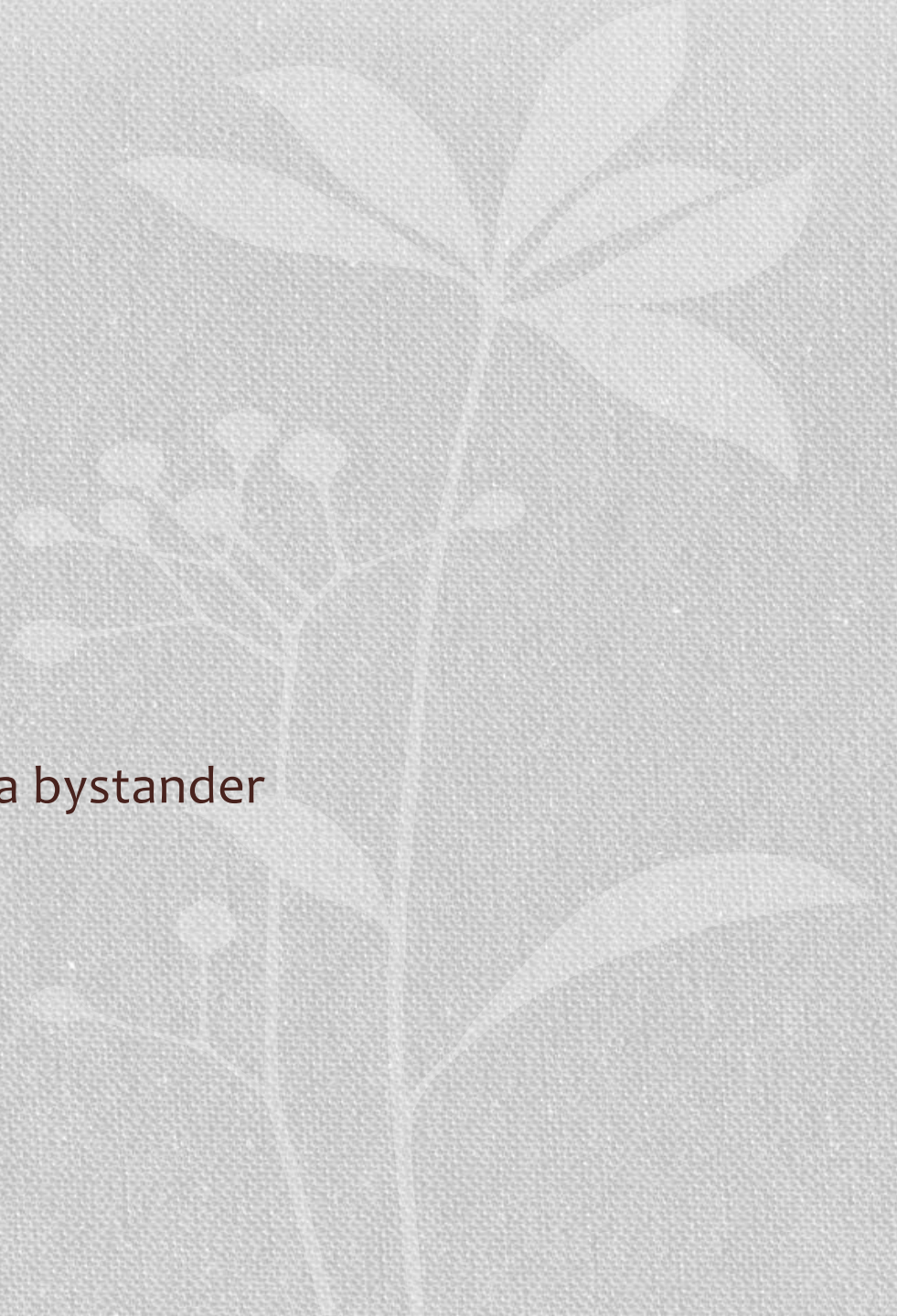

- Bystanders are everyday people in everyday situations:
 - School
 - Work
 - Hallways
 - Board meetings
- We never know when we will be called into the role of a bystander



Blurred Lines: Consent While Drinking

Stated they had sex with someone without their consent

- 4 residential students
- 1 commuter student

Stated that someone had sex with them without their consent

- 10 students in a residence hall
- 1 student in a townhouse/ apartment
- 2 students in an off campus house
- 1 student in a parent or guardian house

“I thought somebody else was going to do something...”

- Bystander Apathy:
 - 1. Social inhibitions
 - 2. Taking cues from others
 - 3. Diffusion of responsibility

How To Be Powerful Bystanders

- 1. Build A Sense of Community
- 2. Be “In the Know”
- 3. Assume Responsibility
- 4. Know Your ABC’s ...
